ARTIST STATEMENT

ROOM-i-Nation is based on my 2023 album ISOLASHUN (New Amsterdam Records), which explores the tension in dual identity and questions the notions of beauty tied to the "classical" aesthetic.

The starting point of the album was the pandemic and the solitude it brought me as an artist. Canceled engagements and long periods of isolation prompted a period of deep reflection on my music, its history, and the politics of the two countries I consider home: India and America.

Conversations around race in America forced me to reflect on my participation in power structures and the tension of being both marginalized and complicit: on one hand I am person of color trying to assimilate in a predominantly white world, and on the other, I am a person of caste-privilege in the Karnatik world that is tied to a history of casteism and erasure.

Room-i-Nation explores internal struggles to fit in and gain validation in both worlds, juxtaposed with stories of migration and assimilation, inspired by conversations I wish I could have had with my late father.

ABOUT THE ARTISTS

Aditya Prakash | Composer, Writer and Performer (Los Angeles)

Award-winning vocalist Aditya Prakash, known for his powerful and emotive voice, is one of the foremost young virtuosos of Karnatik music. He is recognized for his innovative approach to composition, production, and performance.

At the age of 16, he became one of the youngest musicians ever to tour and perform with sitar maestro Ravi Shankar, accompanying him to such prestigious stages as Carnegie Hall, the Hollywood Bowl, and Disney Concert Hall.

Aditya has collaborated with a diverse range of innovative artists, including sitarist Anoushka Shankar, Jazz pianist Tigran Hamasyan, electronic experimental artist Karsh Kale, and the acclaimed dancer and choreographer Akram Khan.

Aditya founded the eclectic music group Aditya Prakash Ensemble, which creates a space for dialogue between Karnatik and jazz. The Ensemble's 2020 album, *Diaspora Kid*, garnered praise from Songlines and KCRW and was featured in the top 15 albums on the Transglobal World Music Chart in May 2020. The acclaimed festival showcase GlobalFEST selected Aditya Prakash Ensemble to perform an NPR Tiny Desk concert in 2021.

Aditya is mentored by two prolific Karnatik artists: musician, activist, and author T.M. Krishna and musician and scholar R.K. Shriramkumar. Aditya received his B.A. in Arts from UCLA's prestigious Ethnomusicology program.

Recently, Aditya produced and composed the musical score for the N.E.F.A. awarded production *She's Auspicious* by Mythili Prakash. One of Aditya's produced songs for the album *HOME*, by Sushma Soma, was selected to be featured on BBC at the Earthshot Awards. Aditya's current focus in production and composition is pushing boundaries within the "classical" tradition.

Mythili Prakash | Director. Writer and Dramaturg (Los Angeles)

Mythili Prakash, a second-generation Indian-American artist from Los Angeles, was trained by her mother, Viji

Prakash, and is currently mentored by Bharata Natyam dancer Malavika Sarukkai and choreographer Akram Khan. She has toured her solo productions globally, performing at venues like Sadler's Wells, Jacob's Pillow and the Esplanade Theatres. Her work *She's Auspicious* received multiple grants and premiered at Reflektor Festival. Nominated as a "choreographer of the future" by Akram Khan, Mythili premiered *HERE and NOW* at Dance Umbrella 2019 and collaborated on *One|All*, which premiered in Doha, Qatar.

Julian-Quán Viêt Lê | Sound Design & Engineer (Fresno, CA)

Julian Lê is a Grammy-winning producer, sound designer, audio engineer, and performer who tours, performs, and produces for world-renowned artists such as Jhene Aiko and Ai. Julian started playing classical piano at the age of three under the guidance of his parents, both of whom are graduates of Indiana's Music Program. He graduated on a full jazz scholarship at UCLA, studying under James Newton and Kenny Burrell, and has won numerous musicianship awards.

Seah Johnson (Lighting & Scenic Design) - Seattle, WA

Seah Johnson has over two decades of freelance production experience as a lighting designer, touring lighting supervisor, production manager, and technical director for various dance, theatre, and opera companies worldwide. She was the resident lighting designer and lighting supervisor at Aspen Santa Fe Ballet for fourteen seasons, lighting world premieres of ballets by Cayetano Soto, Nicolo Fonte, Jorma Elo, Alejandro Cerrudo, Fernando Melo and many more. She is currently the Director of Production and resident Lighting Designer at Alonzo King LINES Ballet and lives in Seattle, WA.

Akram Khan | Artistic Advisor

Akram Khan is one of the most celebrated and respected dance artists today. In the last twenty-three years he has created a body of work that has contributed significantly to the arts in the UK and abroad. His reputation has been built on the success of imaginative, highly accessible and relevant productions such as Jungle Book Reimagined, Outwitting the Devil, XENOS, Until the Lions, Kaash, iTMOi (in the mind of igor), DESH, Vertical Road, Gnosis and zero degrees.


As an instinctive and natural collaborator, Khan's choreography is the embodiment of shared exploration across multiple disciplines and cultures. His previous collaborators include the National Ballet of China, actress Juliette Binoche, ballerina Sylvie Guillem, choreographers/dancers Sidi Larbi Cherkaoui and Israel Galván, singer Kylie Minogue and indie rock band Florence and the Machine, visual artists Anish Kapoor, Antony Gormley and Tim Yip, writer Hanif Kureishi and composers Steve Reich, Nitin Sawhney, Jocelyn Pook and Ben Frost.

YeastCulture | Video Projection

With over two decades of experience, YeastCulture works across art forms blending video design, animation, illustration, set design and projection mapping. Their work has featured in classical performances, contemporary dance, theatre, galleries and world tours. Recently YeastCulture opened the Edinburgh International Festival with a projection mapping performance across one of the cities most significant buildings. Other recent projects include Akram Khan's Jungle Book Reimagined, Cunning Little Vixen and Le Grand Macabre with the London Symphony Orchestra and director Peter Sellars, Desh and Chotto Desh with Akram Khan, Enowate with Dickson MBi, Boy Blue's The Five and the Prophecy of Prana, Bluebeard's Castle with Esa-Pekka Salonen and the San Francisco

Symphony as well as projects with Nitin Sawhney, Cirque du Soleil, Wang Ramirez, Michael Tilson Thomas, Michael Nyman, Ben Okri, Matthew Herbert, Hussein Chalayan, Shobana Jeyasingh Dance, George Fenton, the V&A and many others.


CAP UCLA has a new home for live performance in Westwood!
