

From a janitor's longing for art, to families navigating generational wounds, to the life of a simple snail, the evening promises to expand our own future visions as we follow the work of young people boldly defining and redefining their worlds and histories.

YoungArts – the national foundation for the advancement of artists – was established in 1981 by Lin and Ted Arison to identify exceptional young artists, amplify their potential, and invest in their lifelong creative freedom. YoungArts provides space, funding, mentorship, professional development and community throughout artists' careers. Entrance into this prestigious organization starts with a highly competitive application for talented artists ages 15 – 18, or grades 10 – 12, in the United States that is judged by esteemed discipline-specific panels of artists through a rigorous adjudication process.

ABOUT THE ARTISTS

Paulís Cofresí Cartagena (2022 YoungArts Winner in Film), Nos Persiauen: Born in 2005 in San Juan. Puerto Rico. Paulís Cofresí is a director with a passion for storytelling. At just eight years old, while acting in a local short film, she discovered her calling in filmmaking. Paulís honed her craft at the Escuela Central de Artes Visuales, a renowned visual arts school in San Juan, where she began her journey as a director. Her debut film, X, won Best Short Film at the Puerto Rican Film Foundation Festival in 2020. In 2021 and 2022, Paulís attended the New York Film Academy summer program, directing four more short films, including The Making of My Seasons. She took on multiple roles in the project-director, editor, writer, cinematographer, and composerearning the Rising Star Award at CineYouth and becoming a finalist in the YoungArts competition. Her most recent short film, Nos Persiquen, premiered in theaters across Puerto Rico and won seven awards at the European Film Festival "Cortaditos," including Best Picture and Best Director. The film, a groundbreaking exploration of Puerto Rico's fight

for independence, also screened at Slamdance, HollyShorts, and the All American High School Film Festival, where she won Best Director. Cofresí is currently a sophomore at Pratt Institute, pursuing a degree in film. She is also co-founding a production company while actively writing her next film.

Tangier Dortch (2021 YoungArts Winner in Film), *Epigenetics:* Tangier Dortch is a Belizean-American LA-based filmmaker interested in recontextualizing the Black experience through speculative lenses. At 16, YoungArts awarded him as a 2021 finalist in film for his short *Sid & Me*, which infuses quirky magical realism with a mix of animated and live-action storytelling. In 2022, Tangier won Best Screenplay at Los Angeles County High School for the Arts' Sundown Film Festival, for his supernatural drama *Our Spiritual Lost and Found*, retitled *Epigenetic*. Most recently, while interning at Warner Bros. Discovery, he won the drama category of WBD's Intern Pitch Wars; he competed against WBD interns from across the country, pitching his show *Epigenetic*, a concept based on his short of the same name. Nathan Ginter (2018 YoungArts Winner in Film) The Third Ear:

Nathan Mark Ginter is a writer, director and editor from Kalamazoo, Michigan, making films that incorporate genre and absurdist elements to express our strange human experience. Nathan graduated from Pratt Institute's BFA Film Program, was a Presidential Scholar in the Arts, and was awarded the National Board of Review Student Grant. His films have won Best Short Film at the BFI Future Film Festival and Brooklyn Horror Film Festival, as well as screening at Fantastic Fest, Beyond Fest, New Hampshire Film Festival, Rhode Island Film Festival, Bend Film Festival, BAM and more. His work has been featured on Vimeo Staff Picks, Director Notes, Film Shortage, and NoBudge. He currently works to bring his feature scripts to life.

Thomas Kim (2019 YoungArts Winner in Film), *Busan, 1999:* Thomas' debut stop-motion short, *Trejur*, screened at venues such as Heartland (Indyshorts) and Busan International before receiving the Harry Winston Brilliant Futures award and YoungArts gold medal. Prior to attending USC's Film Production program, his debut live-action short, SI, starring Ki Hong Lee (*Maze Runner*) premiered at the 2020 LAAPFF before being sold to and distributed by HBO/Max. His latest short, *Busan, 1999*, won Best Narrative at the SFFilm Festival and BFI Future Film Festival,

qualifying it for the 2023 Oscars. He is currently in post-production on his debut feature film, *Isle Child*, while in development on his sophomore feature, *Staring at the Sun*, and creating educational content for his popular YouTube series, *The Vandalist*, sharing his journey of becoming a modern artist creating permissionless work. He is a 2022 Sundance Ignite Fellow, 2024 TIFF x CJ Ent. Fellow, 2023 Blacklist Michael Collyer Finalist, 2021 Shorts to Feature Lab Fellow and a 2021 Diverso Minority Report Fellow. Gabriel González (2009 YoungArts Winner in Film), Curator: Gabriel Gomez is a Clio award-winning director, producer and entrepreneur born and raised in Brooklyn, NY. He was a prestigious member of *Brooklyn Magazine*'s "30 Under 30" Class of 2018 & was recently featured by *The New York Times* for their "Up Next" column. Gabriel is the founder/creative director of Crooked Letter, a multifaceted creative production company backed by Jeremy Allen White– Emmy-award winning actor, producer, and star of FX's The Bear. They are a full service, award-winning creative incubator specializing in branded film, long-form and episodic development and production, and theater. They form partnerships with clients and artists of all kinds.

In theater, their investment and/or producing credits include *Illinoise*, *Other People's Dead Dads, Lempicka, Hold Onto Me Darling* and *The Big Gay Jamboree.* One of their leading stage talents, Caleb Eberhardt AKA Rosehardt, made his Broadway debut in 2019 starring in Tarell Alvin McCraney's five-time Tony-nominated play *Choir Boy*, and has since been featured in *The Comeuppance* and the 2024 Tony-nominated *Enemy of the People* alongside Jeremy Strong. His film/TV roles include HBO's *Betty*, and the Ryan Coogler-produced *Judas & The Black Messiah*. Crooked Letter's episodic ventures include a variety of credits on shows featured on CNN, Discovery+, Food Network and more. Their narrative projects have starred notable talent such as David Cross, Ellen Greene and Mitra Jouhari and have circulated film festivals including Hamptons International Film Festival, Montclair Film Festival, and many more. Their branded work specializes in commercial & documentary, focusing on raw character, compelling compositions, and dynamic stories. They've produced projects featuring Zendaya, Shaniqwa Jarvis, Courtney Barnett and more for clients such as On Running, H&M, The North Face, CNN, NIKE, Columbia Records, Mom+Pop Records, TNT, The Guardian, Refinery29 and Bon Appetít.

Tarell Alvin McCraney (1999 YoungArts Winner in Theater), Host:

Tarell Alvin McCraney is an award-winning writer, producer, and educator, best known for his acclaimed trilogy, *The Brother/Sister Plays*. His script *In Moonlight Black Boys Look Blue* is the basis for the Oscar-winning film *Moonlight* directed by Barry Jenkins, for which McCraney and Jenkins also won a Best Adapted Screenplay Oscar. He is an ensemble member at Steppenwolf Theatre and a member of Teo Castellanos D-Projects in Miami, a graduate of New World School of the Arts, The Theatre School at DePaul University, and the David Geffen School of Drama at Yale. He received an honorary doctorate from the University of Warwick. He was recently Co-Chair of Playwriting at the David Geffen School of Drama, where he remains on faculty. He is an associate at the Royal Shakespeare Company, London, and a member of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences (Writers Branch).
